Won't You Be My Neighbor?



Shamrocks - were once a scared plant in ancient Ireland that symbolizes the rebirth of Spring. Later in the 17th century, the shamrock be-came a symbol of Irish nationalism.

Leprechauns - The belief on leprechauns most likely stems from the Celtic belief in fairies. In Celtic folklore, Leprechauns were typically cranky, meddling tricksters.

Pinching - It is common practice to pinch people who are not wearing green on St. Patrick's Day. Legend says that those who wear green are invisible to the mischievous fingers of a Leprechaun.

National Crayon Day - March 31

The History of the Crayola Crayon

Cousins, Edwin Binney and Harold Smith had been business partners since 1885. In 1900, they began producing slate school pencils and dustless school chalk in Easton, PA. They continued to listen to teachers, who were requesting better wax sticks for their classrooms.



Crayons had existed before 1903, however the items produced by Binney & Smith were a safer and cheaper alternative to the art utensils in use at that time. The first boxes released had eight colors: black, brown, blue, red, violet, orange, yellow and green. The boxes sold for a nickel.

We can thank Edwin's wife who was a school teacher for the name we know today, Crayola. Craie, the French name for chalk and Ola, the Latin root for oily.

There are currently 120 standard colors being manufactured. Over the course of time, 50 colors have been retired. The last retirement took place on March 31, 2017 when Crayola announced the retirement of Dandelion.
